**MISSION STATEMENT**

Our mission statement reflects our commitment to community care:

St. Aloisius Medical Center, through a shared ministry with the laity participates in the healthcare mission in their work of healing which is the work of God. Our individual inspiration is Jesus and his Gospel message. Permeated with the Charism of the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation, we minister to one another and to all who come to us for care.

**CRITICAL ACCESS HOSPITAL DESIGNATION**

St. Aloisius was designated as a Critical Access Hospital in 2002. As a critical access hospital, our role is vital to the health and welfare of the community we serve, and therefore qualifies us under the guidelines for reporting community benefits.

St. Aloisius utilizes the CHA Guide for Planning and Reporting Community Benefits in preparation of this report. Total net community benefits expense for FY14 = \$195,038.

**RESPONDING TO THE NEEDS OF THE POOR**

St. Aloisius Financial Assistance/Uncompensated Care Program is available to those with a financial need. Information is available on our website [www.stalouisius.com](http://www.stalouisius.com) or upon request. St. Aloisius Medical Center provided \$6,882 gross charity care or \$6,615 net charity care to five persons during FY14. This is less than prior years due to the Medicaid expansion program having more people become eligible.

The Community Volunteer Coordinator (CVC) has continued to assist with the volunteer programs such as Hospice, Long Term Care and Mentoring.

Other costs of unreimbursed public programs, such as Medical Assistance, totaled net \$78,781 during the past year.

## **BENEFITS FOR THE BROADER COMMUNITY**

St. Aloisius is very supportive of community organizations. The following are examples of services St. Aloisius has provided to the community at large:

- We provide meeting room space for local citizens and non-profit groups. The Presentation Center was unavailable beginning last fiscal year for public use because of long term care storage needs, thus this was not able to be counted in FY14 community benefit report but will be next year.
- We provide office space (in kind) for Public Health and Rural Mental Health consortium staff/clients in our outpatient services building.
- We sponsor monthly radio spots where health issues are addressed
- We have 24/7 Pastoral Care services.
- We provide our Wellness program for the community in our cardiac wellness center.
- We provide Suicide prevention education to the public schools in the county and work with the Community Cares about Suicide Prevention group
- We provide limited donations to local school projects and other community groups
- We provided a Quick Response Paramedic Unit with ALS support to our local volunteer ambulance service but the service was discontinued in Feb. 2014 due to lack of paramedic staff
- We present bi-weekly "Did You Know" health information in the local newspaper (provided in-kind by local businesses)
- We send outdated supplies to local missionaries for distribution world wide
